The head of UN Women for the Asia Pacific Region Ms Roberta Clarke visited the House of Sarah in May. Our talanoa included the extension of the work of the House of Sarah in establishing care, referral and support services for women who had experienced violence in the home; last year's work of raising awareness with women in the 18 parishes in Fiji and involvement of the House of Sarah in the Suva Christian Network (Talanoa) which is encouraging the participation of churches in the 16 Days of Activism against Gender Based Violence campaign. Ms Clarke who is from the Caribbean understood the importance of working with and through churches and faith based organisations in this area. Also attending was Elzira Sagynbaeva – Representative UN Women, Fiji Multi-Country Office (second Right) and UN Women regional staff - Melissa Avarado, Tupou Vere and Saleshni Chaudhary. Revs. Sereima, Ann and Jone Tuiwaiwai and Nai Cokanasiga presented the history, the current work and future challenges the House of Sarah.

# House of Sarah:- Workshops Planned

Sarah Care Workshop - Through the generosity of the New Zealand -'Golden Oldies' we will be providing the first of four workshops for women who were chosen following the GBV Awareness raising workshops as the 'referral' women within their parishes. They will receive training in the Biblical foundations of care support and referral responsibilities as well as learning what resources are available for women in need of assistance. These women will be the 'Sarah Care' groups within their parishes allowing the resources developed by the House of Sarah to be shared by local parishes and communities.

## **Church Leaders Workshops:-**

These workshops will analyse the Genesis creation stories as the bases for reenvisioning gender relations and demonstrate a new understanding of the Household Codes in the New Testament epistles. They will also identify the principles of 'Safe Church' and explain the importance of Title D to the standards of behaviour of church leaders. The first will be conducted in Suva but similar workshops will be held in the North and West at a later date. In conjunction with this workshop the House of Sarah have also developed a baseline survey on the attitudes of clergy and church leaders on women, culture and Biblical interpretation.
