What did the House of Sarah learn from the UNWomen /AusAid funded Gender Based Violence awareness raising workshops?

In conducting workshops in the 18 parishes in Fiji we learned about the many issues confronting women as they strive to live free of violence in their homes. This is what some women shared:

"the workshop empowered me to seek legal advice"

"I now know that violence is a crime and not only is against the law it is against the teaching of the church"

"I learn of the effect that violence was having on my children"

"We were created equal and we have equal human rights – we should exercise these rights"

"There is a need of our men and young boys to have training like this"

Rev. Dr Cliff Bird from Pacific Theological College, led an interactive Bible study õCan love be Violent?ö He brought to us a new understanding of the meaning of ±urn the other cheekøand ±walk the second mileøas well as challenging us to rethink the violence of the cross as part of the plan of a loving God. This was followed by a dramatic worship service using traditional instruments to ±Break the Silenceøand a drama to highlight how Scripture can be use to both bind and liberate women. Over 100 people attended the seminar and worship. Bible readings and prayers written by women from many denominations Were also prepared for each of the 16 Days and printed for use of Womenøs Fellowships across Suva.

Christian Caregiving Training by Malinda Railala

From 17⁻28 February Jaimala and I together with Alena from Wainaloka, Kathy from St Matthewøs, Rev. Evelini from Tonga and Archdeacon Tai from Samoa were given the opportunity to attend this workshop.. The workshop was facilitated by Revd Martin Levine, Principal of Alan Walker Collage of Evangelism, Sydney. We were a group of 25 that included clergy from across the Diocese and John Simmons from Simeon Ministry. The course covered many topics including the Biblical basis of caregiving; how to be a good counsellor; doøs and donøts of counselling; active listening -hearing is what we can do naturally but listening is a skill; the importance of thinking rationally; our belief system and perceptions so much more. We were also taught techniques to allow clients to solve their own problems rather than tell them what to do.



We came away very empowered and so filled with knowledge from all the learnings for the past two weeks ó we learned science, psychology and theology and Jewish culture - our thanks to Martin for giving us the opportunity to witness his ministry.
